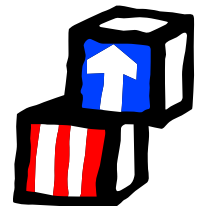

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WV Universal Pre-K Program Summary

West Virginia has been a national pioneer in providing a universal pre-kindergarten (pre-k) program for all four-year-olds and three-year-olds with special needs since passage of Senate Bill 247 during the 2002 legislative session. However, the foundation for pre-k in the state began as early as 1983, when legislation granted local education agencies (LEA) the authority to offer preschool programs. Today, W. Va. Code §18-5-44 requires county school systems to provide Universal Pre-K Programs for all eligible children. By the 2012–2013 school year, county boards of education were required to develop pre-k programs in partnership with community resources such as Head Start and licensed child care centers, with support from the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) and the Department of Human Services (WV DoHS).

West Virginia Board of Education (WVBE) Policy 2525: West Virginia’s Universal Access to a Quality Early Education System (WVBE Policy 2525) was first developed in 2004 to meet state code, related policies, regulations, and address the needs of families of eligible children in West Virginia communities. The WV Universal Pre-K Program includes high-quality pre-k standards to address all areas of children’s development. The WV Pre-K Standards (Ages 3-5) are research-based, developmentally appropriate learning expectations to guide pre-k educators in providing high-quality environments and experiences that are responsive to individual children’s needs to support school readiness efforts.

This annual report provides WV Pre-K data and information for the 2023–2024 school year, with a focus on funding, enrollment, collaboration, and high-quality pre-k programs.

- Blending state and federal funding sources, including state school aid funding, special education, childcare, and Head Start contributions.
- Providing access to pre-k services in settings that best meet children and family needs through collaborative classrooms with community partners. Each school district is required to maximize resources by establishing partnerships, aiming for at least 50% collaboration with community programs when available.
- Implementing the program review process to support and guide local continuous quality improvement planning with individualized data.
- Providing a summary of West Virginia’s rankings published in The National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) 2024 State of Preschool Yearbook.

WV Pre-K Funding

W. Va. Code and policy requires that counties maximize resources by using the existing capacity of community-based programs in a blended model. In a blended model, county programs braid funds from different federal, state, and local sources to facilitate shared resources to support high-quality programs.

**During the 2017 legislative session, the age eligibility date for West Virginia Universal Pre-K was changed from September 1 to July 1 beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. The decrease in pre-k enrollment and participation rates is attributed to changes in the date of age eligibility.*

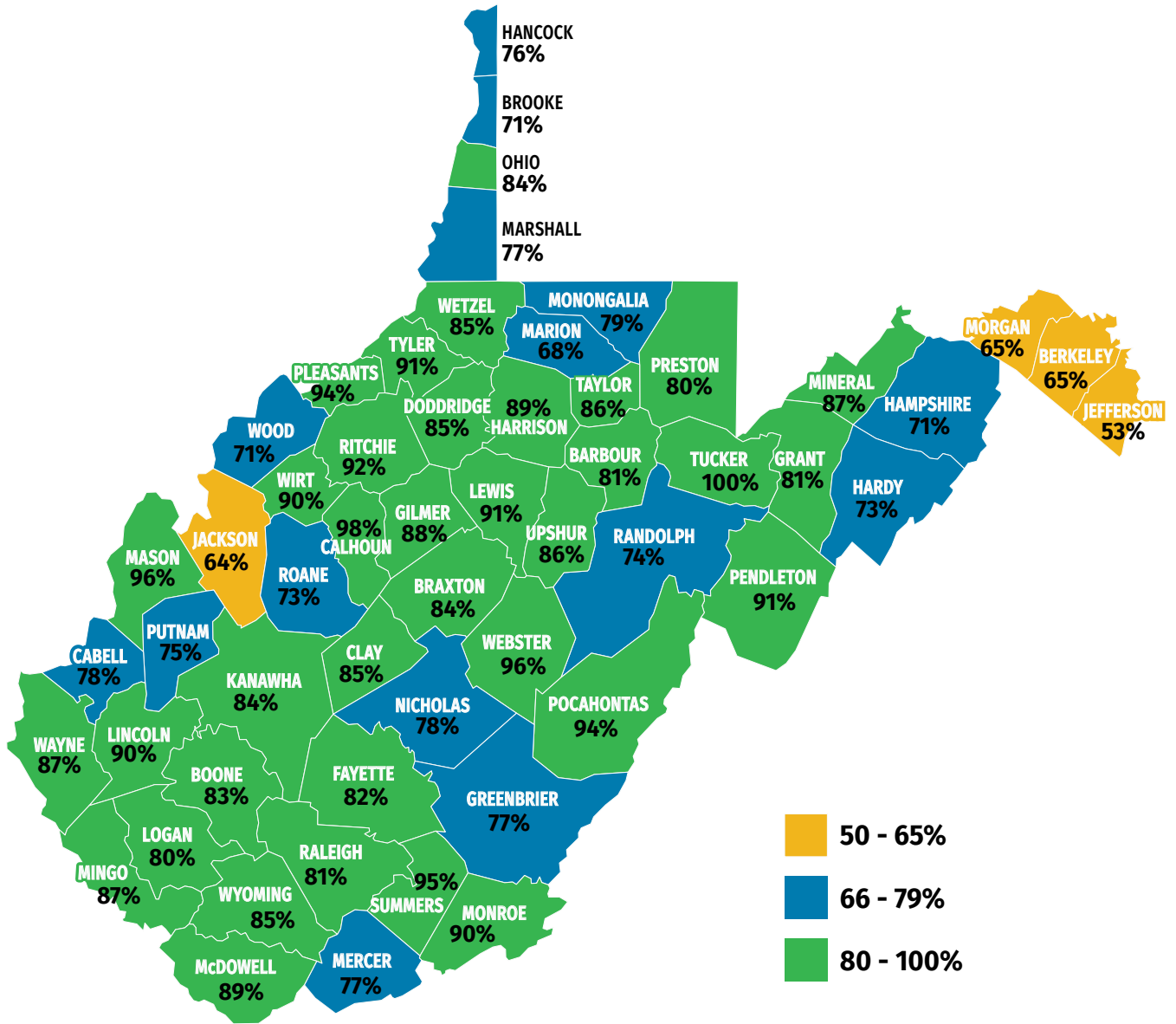

Participation Rate by County- School Year 2023-2024



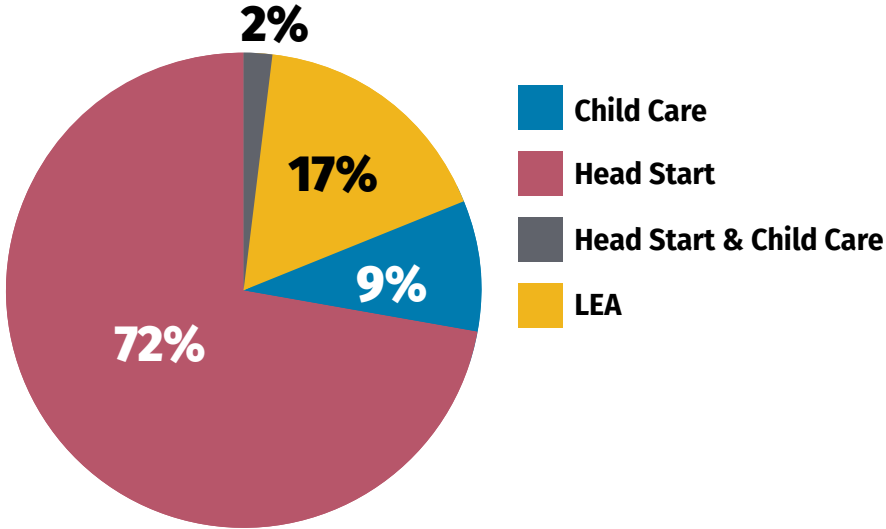
West Virginia's Collaborative Pre-K Model

The West Virginia Universal Pre-K collaborative model is designed to include partnerships among local education LEA, Head Start, and childcare centers. Collaborative partnerships increase access, maximize resources, and increase the quality of programs overall. As counties are required to maintain 50% partnerships with community programs, these collaborations have not only been instrumental in building access prior to the 2012-2013 school year, but they have exceeded collaboration requirements statewide. Because of the state's nationally recognized collaborative approach, an array of services to support school readiness are available to young children and their families.

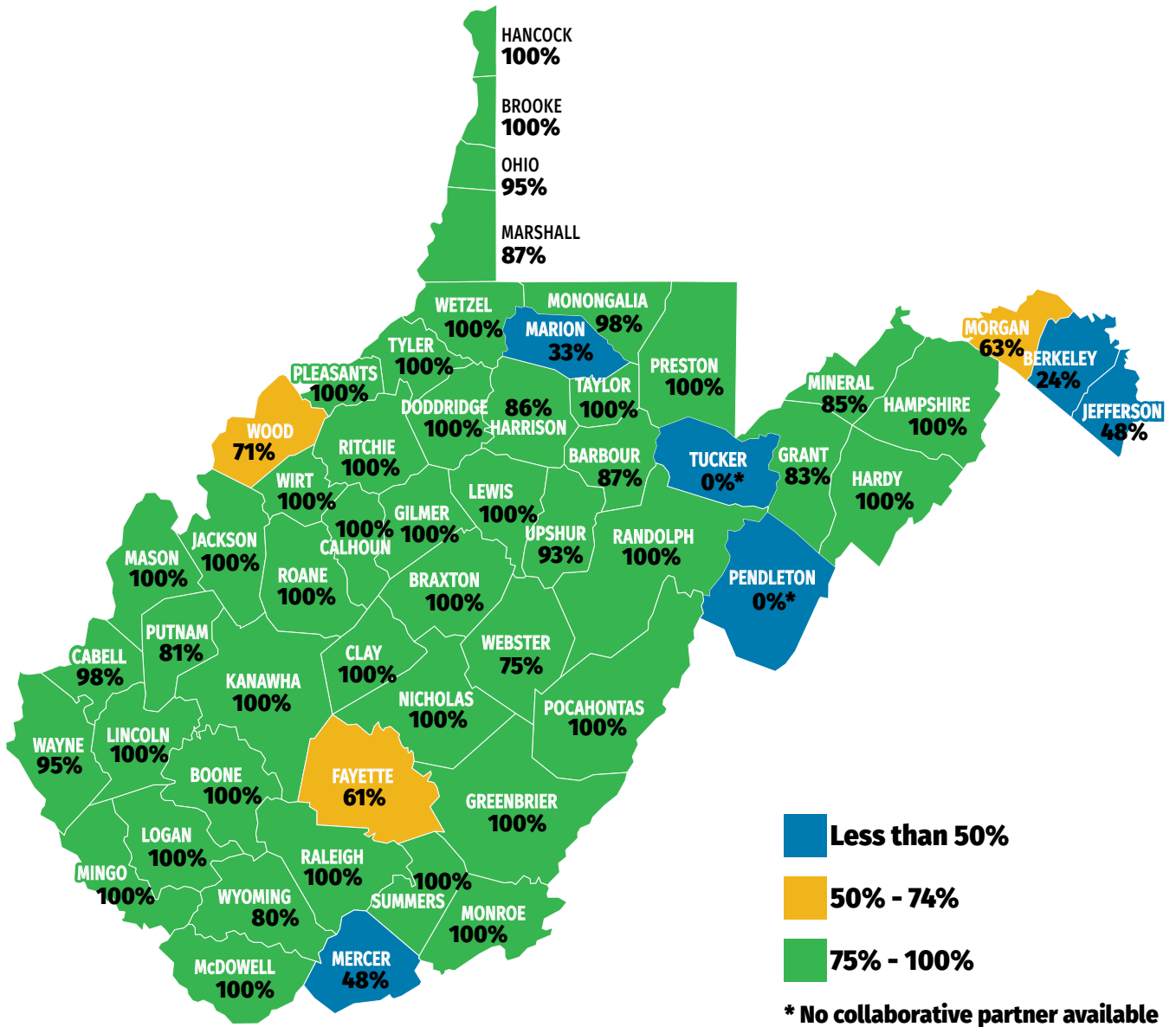

Collaboration Summary - School Year 2023-2024



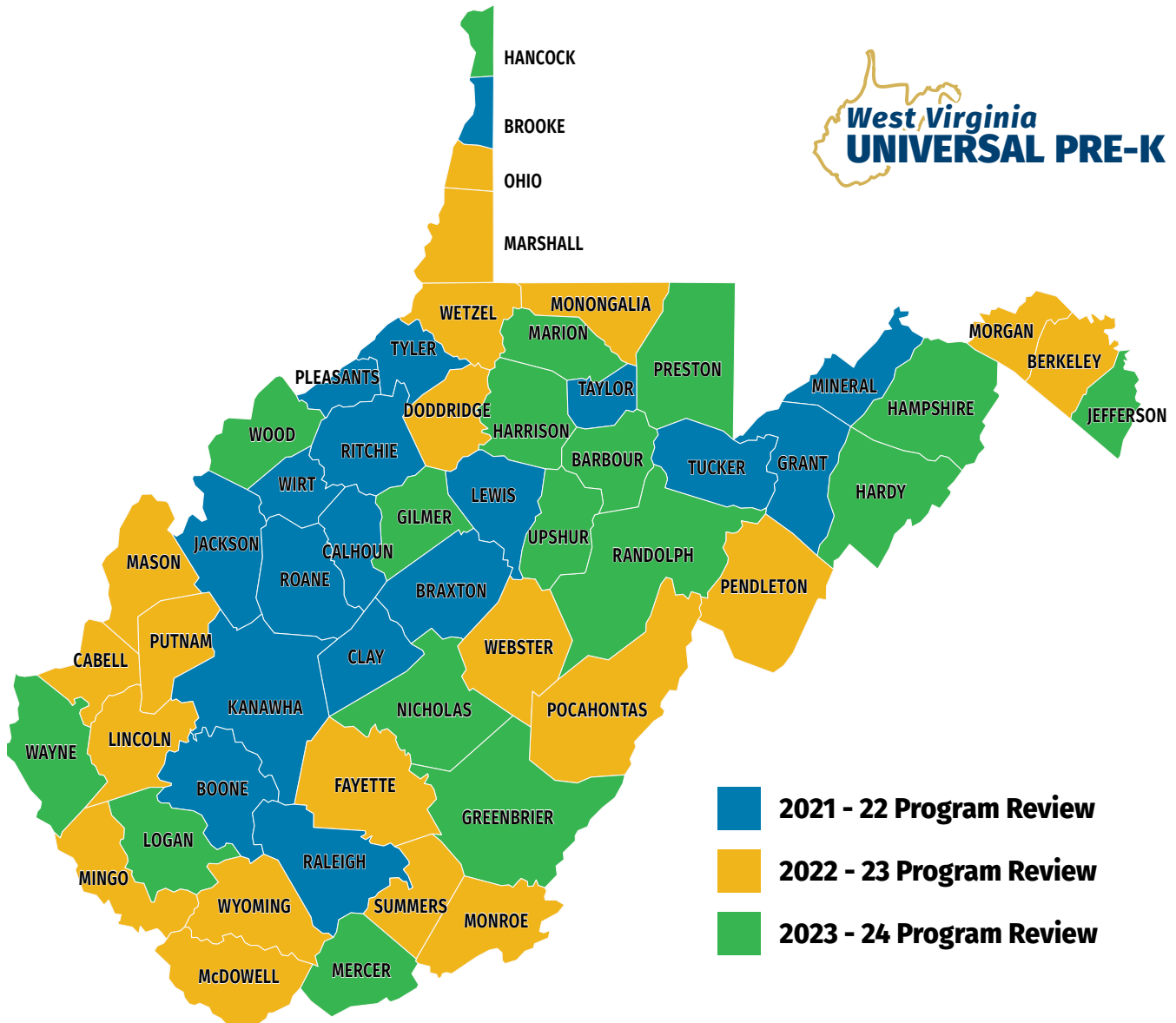
Collaboration Rate by County - School Year 2023-2024



WV Universal Pre-K Program Review

WVBE Policy 2525 requires that the WV Universal Pre-K Steering Team conduct a Pre-K Program Review of each county every three years. The purpose of the program review is to verify that counties maintain implementation of WV Universal Pre-K programs in compliance with policy while supporting continuous quality improvement within each county. Program reviews are designed to provide individualized technical assistance to county collaborative early childhood teams. Further, a summary of the WV Pre-K Program Reviews must be provided annually to the WVBE.

WV Universal Pre-K Program Review Summary School Year 2024

The 2024 Pre-K Program Review summary includes commendations, recommendations, and required follow-up for each county reviewed during the 2023-2024 school year.

- Commendations identify strengths within each county pre-k program.
- Recommendations are provided to strengthen current county policies and procedures to meet WVBE Policy 2525.
- Required follow-up is included when a requirement of WVBE Policy 2525 is not evident through documentation and interviews. When required follow-up is indicated, timelines for corrections are also included, and the WV Universal Pre-K Steering Team is available to support the county collaborative early childhood team in developing program guidelines as part of their continuous quality improvement efforts.

2024 State of Preschool Yearbook: National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER)- West Virginia

The State of Preschool Yearbook is a publication released by the National Institute for Early Education Research (NIEER) to track the funding, access, and policies of state-funded preschool programs. The annual yearbook seeks to improve the public’s knowledge and understanding of state efforts to expand the availability of high-quality education to young children. NIEER ranks states based on access for three and four-year-olds, state and other spending to support the pre-k program, and measures each state’s pre-k policies against a checklist of ten research-based quality standard benchmarks. West Virginia is one of only a few states to meet at least nine of ten quality benchmarks. West Virginia’s profile is included below. *Staff professional development - WVBE Policy 2525 requires that all pre-k staff participate in 15 hours of professional learning annually based on needs determined in the county continuous quality improvement process, which includes program assessment data. Classrooms that are collaborative with Head Start are required to implement a research-based universal pre-k coaching model that utilizes educator self-assessments and data to identify strengths and areas of needed support as part of the CQI process. Further, it is recommended that all WV Pre-K classrooms include an effective pre-k coaching model as part of the CQI process to best support the individualized professional learning needs of education staff. Therefore, West Virginia meets part of the staff professional development NIEER Quality Standard.
