





OFFICE OF CHILD NUTRITION

The Department administers six United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) nutrition programs for children. They include the National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, Child and Adult Care Food Program, Summer Food Service Program, Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program and the Special Milk Program. In West Virginia more than 85 million dollars assist program sponsors to provide healthful, low-cost or free meals and snacks to children and functionally impaired adults in a variety of settings, including public and private schools, child care centers, residential institutions, shelters, family day care homes, summer camps and parks. In addition to providing nutritious meals and snacks, child nutrition programs promote lifelong healthful eating practices by integrating nutrition education, creating healthy learning environments and promoting nutrition in the community.

Child nutrition programs are intended to serve the nutrition needs of all children, regardless of family income. Since the inception of the National School Lunch Act more than 50 years ago, Congress has affirmed the importance of sound nutrition to the health and welfare of children. Nutrition programs enhance learning and quality of life. Children who are well nourished achieve and perform better than those who are not.

The School Lunch Program provides lunches to students in all public schools, 19 private schools and 30 institutions. The School Breakfast Program provides breakfasts in 710 public and 8 private schools and 30 institutions. The Child and Adult Care Food Program is sponsored by 275 child care agencies and subsidizes meals and snacks in 526 centers and 1,323 homes. Seven agencies sponsor nutrition programs in adult day care. The Summer Food Service Program provides meals to children in 489 summer programs (98 sponsors). The Special Milk Program provides milk to children in 9 camps and 9 private schools. Based on current records, West Virginia participants receive daily:

192,586	school lunches (57% free and reduced price)
85,927	school breakfasts (70% free and reduced price)
2,490	afterschool snacks
34,985	meals to children under child care (64% free and reduced price)
12,873	summer meals (100% free)
249	meals to functionally impaired adults
17,524	meals to children in family day care homes

The USDA Team Nutrition Training grants provide grant opportunities to schools, child care institutions, and in-service training to food service and teaching personnel.

The Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) provides all children in participating schools with a variety of free fresh fruits and vegetables throughout the school day. It is an effective and creative way of introducing fresh fruits and vegetables as healthy snack options. The FFVP also encourages community partnerships to support the schools when they offer free fruit and vegetables to children during the school day. West Virginia will receive \$1,421,269 in funding to support this program in the 2010/11 school year.

Title I

Federally funded compensatory education programs in West Virginia operate under Public Law 107-110, known as the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001* (NCLB). Title I is the largest single program of federal aid for elementary and secondary education. Therefore, Title I funding impacts the ability of districts to implement and accomplish the two missions of the United States Department of Education: enforcing equity and promoting excellence in education. The purpose of Title I is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging State academic achievement standards and assessments.

The parts of Title I and the amount of funding allocated in 2009-2010 to various programs in the state are summarized in the chart below.

Title II, Part A

Preparing, Training, and Recruiting Quality Teachers and Principals

Title II, Preparing, Training, and Recruiting High Quality Teachers and Principals was reauthorized under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2002. The purpose of this program is to provide grants to State Educational Agencies, Local Educational Agencies, State agencies for higher education, and eligible partnerships in order to increase student academic achievement through strategies such as improving teacher and principal quality and increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in classrooms and highly qualified principals and assistant principals in schools. Title II also has the responsibility of holding Local Educational Agencies and schools accountable for improvements in student academic achievement. The West Virginia Department of Education's Office of Title II, School & School System Improvement administers the elementary and secondary education portion of the Title II grant.

West Virginia received \$22,769,351 as the FY 2010 allocation; of that amount \$21,985,935 was allocated for local county school systems. The West Virginia Department of Education was allocated \$783,416 for state level training and administration. Of the funds received and administered by the West Virginia Department of Education, less than one half of one percent of the funds retained at the state level are used for statewide administration of the program.

A total of \$21,985,935 of the state allocation flowed to the 55 county school systems. Each county's allocation was based upon the total public and private non-profit school enrollments and in proportion to the county's allocation received under part A of Title I.

Examples of the variety of programs and services provided in school year 2009-2010 include:

- Participation in a variety of research based professional development activities for teachers targeted to individual county needs, including Title I and special education teachers, in collaboration and coordination with other funding sources such as Title I.
- Hiring of qualified teachers to reduce class size especially in lower grades.
- Participation by RESA model Arts Teams in receiving intensive professional in three strands: Critical Thinking and Problem Solving Skills, Strengthening of Arts Programs' Relationships with Parents and Community, and Strengthening of Instructional Management Skills. All three strands will be applied to the core content areas of dance, music, theatre, and visual art. The trainers will be arts teachers whose programs are outstanding MODEL programs in their respective content areas. These teachers will become trainers to develop model programs for arts

teams in each of the eight RESAs in the second year. The third year the arts teams in each RESA will continue professional development for teachers of the arts for all schools in each RESA.

- Continued development of high quality classrooms for pre-kindergarten and kindergarten children because of the growth in this population of professionals as a result of W.Va. Code §18-5-44. This development includes: three week-long college courses specifically designed for WV Pre-k teachers and assistants, an instructional coach to help move professional development for WV Pre-k teachers from awareness to implementation, and the development of a cadre of kindergarten teachers to address issues specific to kindergarten teaching and children.
- Provision of professional development for social studies teachers in civics and personal finance as a 21st Century Skill.
- Development of laboratory modules to provide secondary school science teachers with professional development, curriculum materials, and the necessary technology to conduct rigorous laboratory units in the sciences. These modules will be based on WV CSO's, aligned with state standards and assessments, and designed with consideration of the needs of higher education. The modules will be developed using the concepts set forth by the Partnership for 21st Century Skills and will also be designed to improve student performance on state and college assessments. The laboratory units will include activities on a variety of topics such as digital photography, precise site location using hand-held GPS units, computer-based mapping and software packages, and various other chemical and physical science topics. Teachers who participate in the development of the modules will return for a follow-up session each year to refine and develop their skills and knowledge and to provide professional development to additional teachers.
- Provision of *West Virginia Writes* as a state-wide plan for the professional development of RESAs, administrators and teachers in the core areas of process writing, writing rubrics/assessments, content area writing, on-demand writing, teaching writing with technology and the role of writing in higher education.
- Development of a state team of experts for Classroom Assessment for Learning that will help lead the development of professional learning communities for this 21st century system of assessment for the classrooms of West Virginia.

Math Science Partnership Program
Title II, Part B

The Math Science Partnership (MSP) program was created under the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLB), which reauthorized the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). The goal of the MSP program is to improve academic achievements of elementary and secondary students in mathematics and science by increasing instructional quality. In achieving this aim, the MSP must provide a minimum of a two-week summer institute for teachers with at least four follow-up days of support for teachers' learning during the school year.

The MSP is a competitive grant program awarded to partnerships between eligible county school systems and institutions of higher education. The partnerships must contain these: museums, professional societies, research laboratories, and business and industry organizations may participate. Successful partnerships are ones in which all the participants are willing to take risks. Each partner must have a stake in the outcome, something to gain if the partnership is successful and something to lose if it is not.

The grants are approximately \$189,000 per year for three years. Five projects completed their funding cycle during FY 2010. For the FY 2011, the West Virginia Department of Education will award two new grants. The FY 2011 allocation to West Virginia is \$1,058,763.

Title III

Authorized under Public Law 107-110, No Child Left Behind, Title III subgrants support the efforts of school districts to assist limited English proficient (LEP) students to learn English and meet challenging State Content Standards and Objectives. Districts are eligible to apply for two types of Title III funding. Formula-based Title III grants are awarded based on the number of LEP students enrolled. Immigrant grants are awarded based on significant increases in the number of immigrant LEP students. Title III funds must be used to carry out activities that use approaches and methodologies that are based on scientifically-based research on teaching LEP children and immigrant children. The funds should be used for developing and implementing new language instruction educational programs; expanding or enhancing existing language instruction educational programs; implementing school-wide or system-wide programs designed to restructure, reform, and upgrade all programs, activities, and operations related to the education of limited English proficient students. The following school systems/consortia received Title III funding in FY10.

Title IV Part A

21st Century Community Learning Center Grant Program

The West Virginia Department of Education serves as the administrator for the federally funded 21st Century Learning Center (21st CCLC) grant program. The purpose of the 21st CCLC is to establish and expand community learning centers that will assist learning and development for school age children and their families during out-of-school time. The program is authorized under Title IV, Part B of the Elementary and Secondary Act, H.R.-1. Allocations for each state are based upon the state's student enrollment and Title 1 participation. Since 2004, West Virginia's 21st Century CCLC programs have served 102,917 children in 152 centers through the provision of meaningful academic enrichment opportunities.

Rural and Low Income School Program
Title VI, Part B, Subpart 2

The Rural and Low-Income School Program is a new program as of the passing of the No Child Left Behind Amendments to ESEA in 2001. The program targets rural school districts that serve high numbers of poor students. Not all West Virginia counties are eligible for the program, and the number of eligible counties varies from year to year. County school systems are eligible if they have 20 percent or more of the children aged 5 through 17 served by the system from families with incomes below the poverty line and all the schools served by the county are rural as defined by this program. For FY 2010 the allocation for the Rural and Low-Income School Program was \$2,923,975. Of this amount, \$2,779,677 was allocated to county school systems and \$144,298 was retained by the state for administration, monitoring, and technical assistance. The twenty-eight (28) county school systems eligible for Rural and Low-Income School program funding have a great amount of flexibility in how to use the funds from this grant. The funding for this program can be used for any expense that would be eligible for funding in any of the following programs:

1. Title I, Part A - Improving academic achievement of the disadvantaged.
2. Title II, Part A - Recruitment, retention and professional development for teachers and principals.
3. Title II, Part D – Educational technology.
4. Title III - Language instruction for limited English proficient students.
5. Title IV – Providing for safe and drug free schools and communities.
6. Parental Involvement in any program.

Once a county school system is identified for improvement they may only continue to use the funds in this program if it is spent for school improvement activities targeted at the reason they were identified.

The largest portion of this grant in eligible counties in West Virginia supports teacher professional development activities and provides for integration of technology into the curriculum.

SECOND MONTH REPORT ELIGIBLE COUNT

The eligible count of students with exceptionalities is reported to the Office of School Finance for computation of adjusted enrollment in the Public School Support Program. Prior to 2008-2009, students with exceptionalities receiving special education services by the end of the second school month received additional weighting in the school-aid formula to yield the county's adjusted enrollment. Beginning in FY09, legislative revisions to the Public School Support Program based funding primarily on net enrollment. For the first five years, however, districts projected to receive less funding under the new computation continue to receive an adjustment based on the amount they would have received using the adjusted enrollment calculation.

The total number of exceptional students at the end of the second school month for the 2009-2010 school year was 49,827. The eligible count for the 2008-2009 school year was 50,500. Therefore, FY10 shows a decrease of 673 students.

MEDICAID

For more than 15 years, the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE) has been authorized to seek federal Medicaid reimbursement for health-related services that are part of a student's Individualized Education Program (IEP). The reimbursable services are speech, physical and occupational therapies, psychological services, audiology and private duty nursing services provided to eligible students.

In January 2000, in collaboration with the Department of Health and Human Resources, the WVDE included six (6) additional services to be reimbursed by Medicaid. Those services are initial/reevaluation treatment planning, annual/update treatment planning, care coordination, personal care services and specialized transportation vehicles and aides. The rates for these services are calculated based on school districts' costs.

The WVDE developed a system for billing these services directly with the eight (8) Regional Education Service Agencies (RESAs) acting as the billing/processing agents for the Local Education Agencies (LEAs). The billing system was incorporated into the West Virginia Education Information System (WVEIS), establishing an electronic billing record. Data may be entered from either the LEA or RESA level.

As a result, \$48.3 million in federal Medicaid reimbursement was received by LEAs statewide in FY 2010. West Virginia returns 100 percent of its federal Medicaid reimbursement to the LEAs and RESAs using state and local education funds to certify the State's match.

PRESCHOOL CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

In the 2009-2010 school year, special education and related services were provided to 5754 children ages 3-5, including children identified as preschool special needs, speech-language impaired and other disabilities as per available information. These services promoted their skills in all developmental areas. In addition, each eligible family is involved in an active partnership with education to enhance the child's development and promote family empowerment.

SERVICES TO STUDENTS WITH DEAFBLINDNESS

One hundred twenty (120) children, birth through 21, have been identified as deafblind in West Virginia based on the DeafBlind Census, conducted annually by the WVDE. These are children with hearing and visual impairments occurring together, the combination of which causes such severe communication and other developmental and educational challenges that they cannot be appropriately educated in special education programs solely for children with deafness or blindness. Federal funds appropriated under this program are to improve special education and related services for these children. The project currently serves the one hundred twenty (120) children who are deafblind and their families, teachers and service providers throughout the state.

WV SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION

The Office of School Transportation acts as the agency for the Department of Education in providing safe and efficient school transportation for all public students in West Virginia. School bus transportation is the safest way to transport a child to school. Fatal crashes involving occupants are extremely rare events, even though school buses serve daily in every community. Every school day across West Virginia, 3795 buses transport 236,000 students. Last year West Virginia did not have a single child killed as a school bus occupant while traveling over 42,000,000 miles. The Office of School Transportation provides the following services to the county school systems:

- Provide certification, training, inspections, coordination, and technical assistance to assure the performance of safe, efficient transportation of all students riding a school bus to and from school.
- Ensure all school bus operators in West Virginia are properly licensed, certified, trained, and are physically fit to perform their duties safely and effectively.
- Ensure all public school buses in West Virginia are in the best possible mechanical condition by regularly scheduled inspections.
- Promote school bus safety programs.

The minimum requirement of forty hours of classroom and 12 hours of skills training for all school bus operator applicants, required annual refresher training of twelve hours, written examinations, annual physical examinations, criminal records checks, motor vehicle records checks, and pre-employment and random drug and alcohol screening combine to make West Virginia among the leaders in our nation in the amount of training and testing required for school bus operators.

Each summer, more than 400 people attend the school transportation conference. During the conference many timely and informative workshops and in-service sessions are held for county transportation administrators and maintenance mechanics.

The Office of School Transportation is responsible for regulating the minimum requirements for design and equipment of school buses. West Virginia leads the way in school bus safety and school bus design and construction. School transportation officials from around the United States recognize and respect the performance, efficiency, and safety record of school transportation in West Virginia.

OFFICE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

The Office of School Facilities (OSFac) provides facilities oversight and technical assistance for West Virginia's county school systems in the following ways: 1) indoor air quality investigation and remediation, 2) building automation design and operational technical support, 3) Heating Ventilating technical support, 4) Federal and State regulatory implementation and evaluations, 5) energy management and utilization, 6) plant operations and maintenance, 7) Comprehensive Educational Facilities Plans (CEFPs) development and administration, 9) accountability and responsibility for the West Virginia State Board of Education Policies' 6200, 6201, 6202, 6203, and 6204, and 10) facilities reviews for all School Building Authority financed schools. The professional staff supports and enhances a safe and comfortable environment for children to learn and play. The Executive Director is the State Superintendent's liaison with Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety, Homeland Security, and the State Office of Emergency Management.

In March 1999, the West Virginia Legislature enacted legislation that provides for investigation and resolution of indoor air quality issues in public schools. The OSFac in conjunction with the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, Radiation, Toxics and Indoor Air Division developed a policy for investigating complaints of compromised indoor air quality in school facilities.

The progress made in improving school facilities in recent years has drawn national recognition defining the West Virginia Department of Education's, Office of School Facilities, as a world-class leader in enhancing the indoor learning environment.

The OSFac has saved the county systems millions of dollars in operational costs since its inception. The cost savings include technical assistance in energy, maintenance, indoor air quality, engineering, construction and design, risk management, and training that we provide at no expense to the county school systems.

Our staff members include a Certified Indoor Environmentalist, a Certified Mold Environmentalist, a mechanical engineer, and a Registered Educational Facilities Manager (REFP).

Additionally, staff members are members of the Association of Physical Plant Administrators, the American Society of Heating, Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE), the Construction Owners Association of America, and the Indoor Air Quality Association of America.






Cedar Lakes Conference Center was established by an act of the Legislature in 1949 as the home for the West Virginia Future Farmers of America and the West Virginia Future Homemakers of America. Officially opened in 1955, the camp continues to grow each year. The name more commonly used is Cedar Lakes Conference Center, which more accurately reflects its growing role in the state.

Cedar Lakes has approximately 275 acres of land and 52 buildings to provide lodging, meeting and food facilities for over 700 people. Cedar Lakes was constructed primarily with contributions that were supplemented by state and federal funds. It is estimated that the total assets of Cedar Lakes Conference Center are valued at over \$15,000,000.

Over 182,500 people utilized Cedar Lakes' facilities last year. In 2010, the guest population represented all 55 states, the District of Columbia and many foreign countries. Cedar Lakes offers an inspirational retreat setting for business, education and recreation. The facilities are adaptable to meet the needs of corporate, civic, church, camp, family, social and government groups.

Cedar Lakes has dedicated itself to serving the youth of West Virginia by providing an affordable conference center where youth can meet and be housed while developing their leadership skills. In addition to the FFA and FCCLA, Cedar Lakes provides facilities to other organizations such as the Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA), Technology Student Association (TSA) many other school sponsored activities, including 24 high school bands during the summer.

The 6th Annual Winterfest Activities and Light Show drew over 30,200 people through the center during the end of November through the end of December 2009. The total value of displays, grants and cash donated exceeds \$585,000. Career and Technical students from Mingo County, Roane-Jackson Technical Center, and Mason County won awards in the 2009 Winterfest Light Competition.

Of major cultural importance, Cedar Lakes Craft Center offers a variety of weekend and week long craft classes along with nationally recognized Elderhostel workshops. Cedar Lakes is also home to the Mountain State Art & Craft Fair. The 2009 Fair drew over 16,000 visitors who purchased \$565,000 from 150+ crafters and artisans. The Fair adds over one million dollars annually to the economy of West Virginia.
