## Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) Policies and Procedures for Disallowing Meals

## **Criteria for Disallowance**

All meals served in the SFSP must comply with the SFSP regulations (<u>7 CFR 225</u>) and the <u>SFSP</u> <u>Meal Patterns</u>. Meals served in any of the following scenarios do not comply with the SFSP regulations, and will be disallowed by the West Virginia Department of Education (WVDE):

- If the WVDE determines that a sponsor has failed to plan, prepare, or order meals with the objective of providing only one meal per child at each meal service at a site, the WVDE shall disallow the number of children's meals prepared or ordered in excess of the number of children.
- 2. If the WVDE observes meal service violations when conducting a site review, the WVDE shall disallow all meals observed to be in violation. Examples of meal violations include meals that do not comply with the SFSP meal pattern, adult meals and meals carried offsite.
- 3. The WVDE shall disallow children's meals that are in excess of a site's approved level established under <u>225.6(h)(2)</u>.

## **Procedure for Disallowance**

The disallowance procedure for meals that do not comply with SFSP regulations includes the steps indicated below:

- 1. The WVDE will log the information into ACES.
- 2. The WVDE will notify the sponsor of the date, Summer Meals site, number of meals impacted, and justification for meal disallowance.
- 3. The WVDE will require that the sponsor to provide corrective action for the compliance issue.
- The WVDE will review the daily site meal count sheet and sponsor meal count consolidation during administrative review to ensure that the sponsor did not claim meals for reimbursement by SFSP funds.
