Challenges Facing America



 Technicians and skilled trade workers are two of the three jobs employers are having a hard time filling globally.

(Manpower Group, Talent Shortage Survey Results, 2011)

 Middle skill jobs (those jobs that generally require some significant education and training beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree) will account for about 45 percent of all job openings through 2014. (Bureau of Labor Statistics, Occupational Outlook Handbook, 2010-2011 Edition)

Facts



- One quarter of America's workforce that's 31 million people — are employed in one of the 130 occupational titles served by SkillsUSA. (Bureau of Labor Statistics [BLS] figures. Total workforce is 124 million.)
- High-school students in career and technical education (CTE) programs have a higher-than-average graduation rate. The average high-school graduation rate for students concentrating in CTE programs is 90 percent, compared to an average national freshman graduation rate of 74.9 percent.






SkillsUSA POLL RESULTS



High School Completers

- 45 percent go to work
- 36 percent go to college
- 6 percent go to apprenticeshing or other postsecondary
- 5 percent go to the military
- 4 percent none of the above
- 4 percent teacher was unsure

College/Postsecondary Completers

- 72 percent go to work
- 10 percent pursue graduate work
- 10 percent go to apprenticesl or other additional postsecondary training
- 2 percent go to the military

NATIONAL LEADERSHIP AND SKILLS CONFERENCE

- More than 16,000 people including students, teachers and business partners participate in the weeklong event
- Students work against the clock and each other, proving their expertise in occupations such as electronics, computer-aided drafting, precision machining and medical assisting
- Contests are run with the help of industry, trade associations and labor organizations. The SkillsUSA Championships requires a \$36 million investment from business and industry and occupies 16 football fields of floor space. There were more than 5,900 competitors in 2013
