

Economically Disadvantaged Students

ZoomWV Data Dashboard, 2nd Month/October 1st Certified Enrollment Collection. The method of identifying students as economically disadvantaged changed between 2013 and 2023. Beginning in the 2017-2018 school year, WVDE began reporting the "low SES" subgroup using only the students who are directly certified as eligible for free or reduced-price meals. In SY12-13, all students eligible for nutrition assistance via any mechanism/ circumstance were counted in the low SES subgroup. Number of Homeless Students

In SY23, the West Virginia Department of Education made a change to the homeless data collection. Previously, students' homeless designations were completely re-set at the start of a new school year, and county homeless liaisons had to re-identify every individual student. With the transition to WVEIS 2.0, the WVDE retains students' homeless designations from one year to the next to ensure consistency from one year to the next.

Under the leadership of the West Virginia Board of Education (WVBE), the WVDE is actively addressing these challenges through innovative initiatives, expert proficiency, and passionate resolve. Failure is not an option when it comes to West Virginia students because student achievement and safety are of the highest priorities. The focus remains on thoroughly preparing students for a lifetime love of learning through various programs, ideas, recognitions, and legislation.

SUPPORTING STUDENT SUCCESS

Communities In Schools Continues Statewide Expansion

First Lady Cathy Justice, the WVDE and site coordinators have further expanded Communities In Schools (CIS) with more counties anticipated in the near future. Currently, **52** counties and **257** schools are participating in West Virginia impacting more than **100,000** students with extensive dropout intervention supports. More than **99%** of case-managed students subsequently stayed in school. The Friends with Paws initiative, championed by the First Lady, has placed **12** therapy dogs in CIS schools across the state.

Guys and Ties Visit Area School

Gentlemen from the WVDE attended the "Guys and Ties" mentoring event at Dunbar Middle School in April 2023. Young men in the eighth grade class learned how to tie a tie from the adults and shared a delicious breakfast. The men had the opportunity to provide words of wisdom and encouragement to the young

learners. This was just one of many events that brought WVDE staff to schools throughout the year.

West Virginia Tiered System of Support (WVTSS)

Through inter-office collaboration, the WVDE has adopted the West Virginia Tiered System of Support (WVTSS) which provides a framework that supports the whole child. Schools implementing WVTSS encourage appropriate challenge, safety, health, active engagement, and support for all students. The three components of academics, behavior, and mental health are supported by family and community, culture and climate, leadership and teams, and assessment.

Summer SOLE

Summer Student Opportunities for Learning and Engagement (SOLE) continued for a third year in counties throughout the state. These programs provide interactive and highly engaging

activities that support students' academic and social-emotional needs. SOLE was created through Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief (ESSER II) funds and included at least four weeks of programming with full-day opportunities for K-8 students. Transportation and meals were also provided.

Summer SOLE 2022 Highlights

- » 24,395 students served
- » 468 sites across the state
- » 68.8% of attending students either maintained or made gains on countyselected pre- and post-assessments for English Language Arts
- » 64.8% maintained or made gains in mathematics

Purple Star Awards Expand

The WVDE and Common Ground Compact recognized schools and districts committed to meeting the needs of military-connected children by awarding them the Purple Star

Award. Counties are recognized for having 100% of their schools participate in the program. In total, **270** schools and **14** counties have won the award.

ACADEMIC COMPETITIONS

West Virginia Academic Showdown

The West Virginia Academic Showdown returned in 2023 with a field of **71** high school teams from **26** counties — an increase of **51** teams since the inaugural year. This scholarly competition tested students' knowledge in topics such as literature, math, history, science, sports, pop culture, and more.

The Academic Showdown is a partnership between the WVDE, the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture, and History, and West Virginia Public Broadcasting.

The WVDE, the West Virginia Legislature, American Electric Power, and Microsoft® provided prize money.

- » Grand Champion: Morgantown High School Team 1, Monongalia County: \$10,000 with each team member receiving \$2,500
- » Second Place: George Washington High School, Kanawha County: \$8,000 with each team member receiving \$2,000

Golden Horseshoe

This year marked the **307th** anniversary of the Golden Horseshoe legacy, and it remains the longest-running program of its kind in the country with annual state recognitions dating back to 1931. The WVDE recognized **226** Knights of the Golden Horseshoe this year with approximately **15,000** eighth grade students recognized since its inception.

Following the success of the 2022 Golden Horseshoe Sword Smithing Design Contest, First Lady Cathy Justice invited high school students to submit designs for a new knighting bench for the ceremony. Designing students worked with career technical education centers to bring their creations to life.

Austin Morrison and Marin Wickline from Cabell County Career Technology Center won the top honor with their Buckingham Palace inspired design. Fabrication artisans assisting with the construction included Caden Stephens, Alex Stephens, Kylee Call, Carsyn Ward, Joey Jones, Laiken Brotherton, Samb Board, Katherine Wilson, Austin Shoemaker, Kane Ray, Nick Prichard, and Hunter Huff.

West Virginia Social Studies Fair

More than **470** elementary and middle school students participated in the 2023 West Virginia Social Studies Fair, making it one of the largest fairs in recent years. Entries included more than **300** projects exploring topics from anthropology and political science to history.

West Virginia Science and Engineering Fair

Students prepared amazing scientific displays and experiments at the West Virginia Science and Engineering Fair, and 2023 highlights included **206** students from **26** counties presenting **161** projects.

Young Writers Day

West Virginia Young Writers Day celebrated 40 years of student writing. Keynote speaker and West Virginia author Homer Hickam addressed 208 students in attendance. Participants also engaged in writing workshops with local authors.

Arts Alive

This was the **17th** year of the premier arts showcase featuring West Virginia's most talented pre-K-12 students in the visual and performing arts.

- » More than 200 students participated in monologues, music solos, instrumental and vocal ensembles, and dance.
- » 150 pieces of art submitted

EXPANDING PATHWAYS AND INNOVATING EDUCATION

Students and families are discovering the benefits of CTE and the impact it has on success after high school. West Virginia's CTE programs empower students to explore potential careers in various hands-on, technical training programs. These opportunities not only teach students real-world knowledge and skills, but also provide opportunities for industry-recognized credentials and meaningful work-based learning experiences. The WVDE continues to explore and expand CTE options for students in high school and middle school.

Approximately **95%** of West Virginia CTE students were positively placed in the following options after high school:

- » Education (Post-Secondary): 52%
- » Employment: 40%
- » Enlistment (Military): 3%

Work Readiness (NOCTI)

- **>> 59%** of students met the workforce entry score
- * 410 students received the Governor's Workforce Credential
- » 2,554 students earned college credit
- >> 50% of students exceeded state averages
- » 46% of students exceeded national averages

During the 2022-2023 school year, the Career Technical Education Office:

- » Launched CareerTech WV initiative to promote CTE programs to parents, students, and business leaders across the state
- » Developed careertechwv.com website, videos, and marketing materials to use when promoting CTE

Focusing on the Future

It all starts with reading. The WVDE launched the Ready, Read, Write, West Virginia Initiative in January 2023 to address student proficiency in reading. A child who cannot read is a child who cannot succeed in the classroom and in life. Reading is the foundational skill upon which other learning is built. Progress on the campaign includes:

- » Creating a website for administrators, teachers and families/guardians that provides curated and continuously updated resources
- » Hosting county teams of administrators and educators at INVEST conferences to develop strategies to implement the initiative in their schools
- Passing of House Bill 3035, the Third Grade Success Act, providing much needed support, structure, and funding to the focus on student learning
- >> Implementing the Leaders of Literacy Advisory Council to advise and assist in promoting the initiative
- » Producing earned and paid media to build awareness of the importance of reading and WVDE campaign

Ready, Read, Write, West Virginia is rooted in the

Science of Reading,
a body of research that
proves how the brain learns
to become a proficient reader
and writer. The strategy is built on
the Five Pillars of Reading — phonological
and phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency,
vocabulary, and comprehension. Ready, Read,
Write uses these pillars plus writing to focus on early
reading proficiency among the earliest learners.

ReadyReadWriteWV.com: This website was designed to assist core audiences with resources to support student learning and progress. Administrators, teachers, and families/guardians have access to an array of literacy materials, websites, videos, and other assets to build literacy skills for a lifetime of learning.

Leaders of Literacy: More than 30 individuals representing government, businesses, non-profits, education, families, and communities joined the WVDE's literacy campaign to offer support and guidance. Collectively known as the Leaders of Literacy Advisory Council, these individuals work to engage a broader network of stakeholders in the statewide literacy effort.

- Developed a CareerTech WV Guide that features the 16 national CTE career clusters, potential careers and job outlook data.
- » Kicked off a new CTE Spotlight Series that highlights outstanding teachers, students, and administrators explaining why they love CTE. More than 50 spotlights have been posted to websites and social media.
- » Partnered with West Virginia Public Broadcasting and The Space Gal Emily Calandrelli to film season 2 of The Future Is You. The series features young women pursuing careers in aerospace and robotics through CTE programs at James Rumsey Technical Institute in Martinsburg.

Middle School Initiative

Middle School CTE allows students to find their passion and envision themselves doing something they love. During the 2021-2022 school year, **11,000** middle school students completed at least one CTE course.


The WVDE offers three middle school initiatives that allow students to explore CTE in their classrooms.

» Discover Your Future is a middle school course designed to introduce students in 6th – 9th grades to future career opportunities across the 16 career clusters. Discover Your Future is being implemented at 54 schools

implemented at **54** schools across **34** counties.

- The Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Gateway program helps students build knowledge and skills in the pathways of computer science, engineering, and biomedical science. There are currently 41 Gateway schools across 19 counties.
- The Empowerment Collaborative is a school-wide environment/instructional shift focused on content and career exploration through community-based, student-driven projects. There are currently two pilot schools.





Things are in Full Swing

Students from the Nicholas County Career Technical Center partnered with the West Virginia Department of Tourism to construct handcrafted "Almost Heaven" swings to be placed at scenic locations around the state. CTE has provided these students an opportunity to gain hands-on experience and learn the vital skills they will need to prepare for gainful employment following graduation.

The WVDE is also working to connect businesses with middle schools for a guest speaker series. The WVDE has a database with more than 300 businesses to help middle school teachers connect students with local business and industry leaders.

Operation Christmas Crumble Culineering Challenge

Nine teams of culinary, engineering, computer science, and robotics students designed and constructed mobile sleighs made from gingerbread and mechanical attachments to compete in the inaugural Operation Christmas Crumble Culineering Challenge at James Rumsey Technical Institute. Based on the Netflix® series Baking Impossible, this competition promoted the collaboration of STEM, culinary, and hospitality pathway students.

Advanced Career Education

Advanced Career Education (ACE) offers high school graduates the opportunity to earn certifications, licenses, and on-the-job training experience in growing industries across the state, creating a highly skilled talent pipeline for West Virginia.

- » ACE programs in West Virginia include the fastest growing industries including construction, healthcare, hospitality and tourism, manufacturing, human services, and transportation.
- » ACE students can earn credentials in high-demand fields including Commercial Driving (CDL), Licensed Practical Nursing, Heavy Equipment Operations and more.

Adult Education

West Virginia Adult Education (WVAdultEd) programs offer adults opportunities to acquire and improve the skills necessary to enhance their quality of life. Designed to help adult students learn, train, and succeed, these programs foster a pathway to productive employment, personal and family growth, self-esteem, and enhanced dignity. Adult Education courses are offered at no cost to the participant.

- » Served **9,986** adult students in 2022.
- » Collaborated with all nine West Virginia community colleges to offer CMS Certification course. This course offers deep math remediation, and those who complete the course can receive general education math requirement toward an associate degree.
- Signed a memorandum of understanding with New River Community and Technical College to award students up to 17 college

- credits for earning industry-recognized certifications.
- Developed support and training modules for the West Virginia School Service Personnel Association to assist individuals in applying and testing for service personnel openings across the state.
- Expanded awareness of the "It's Never Too Late to Graduate" campaign with Landau Eugene Murphy Jr. by partnering with West Virginia University and Marshall University athletic departments.

Option Pathway

The Option Pathway program provides high school students who are at least 16 years old and who are at-risk of not graduating with their cohort, the opportunity to remain in school and earn a high school diploma or high school equivalency (HSE) diploma. This program consists of three options which can be found at https://wvde.us/adult-education.

Option 1: Students earn a diploma by passing the high school equivalency exam and complete a state-approved CTE program.

Option 2: HSE Credit Recovery allows high school seniors to recover core credits by passing corresponding content or HSE tests.

Option 3: HSEA Opportunity provides students who are 17 or 18 years old and want to drop out the ability to take the HSE test while enrolled in school so they can earn their HSE diploma before leaving school.

Since the Option Pathway's inception, more than **9,500** Option 1 and Option 2 students have received their high school diplomas. In addition, more than **800** high school equivalency diplomas have been awarded to Option 3 students.

Mountaineer Challenge Academy (MCA)

This 22-week program is designed for academically challenged youth, 16 to 18 years old, and offers them a second chance to obtain their basic education through the Option Pathway. Upon completion they earn a diploma from their home high school.

- The high school graduation pathway for MCA is a blend of the National Guard Youth Challenge Program courses and the high school equivalency test. Upon successful completion, students earn their high school diploma from their home high school.
- » More than 1,700 cadets have successfully completed this rigorous pathway.

Public Service Training

- West Virginia Public Service Training prepares individuals for a wide variety of career opportunities to serve their communities in the areas of Emergency Medical Services, Firefighter/Officer, Rescue, Hazardous Materials, Operations and Technician, and Water/Wastewater Operator.
- In fiscal year 2022, 39,444 students were served, 4,041 training classes provided, and 108 International Fire Service Accreditation Congress certifications obtained.

CHALLENGE ACCEPTED: Mountaineer Challenge Academy provides cadets with a safe and structured learning environment as well as hands-on career training.





Becomin Math Masters

Mathematics is a universal language that transcends culture, socioeconomic status, religion, and language. It is a foundational skill used in nearly every aspect of life. That is why the WVDE refocused attention on the essential building blocks of student progress through the UNITe with Numeracy initiative. This comprehensive plan for educators, families and students strives to elevate the current math4life program that began before the pandemic. Goals include enhancing teacher content knowledge, improving teacher pedagogy, increasing student achievement and engagement, and providing resources to supply learners with the tools they need to be successful mathematicians.

UNITe with Numeracy Soft Launch

The Department introduced the new math effort with a soft launch that included an introductory video, brochures, assets, and supports introduced at the summer INVEST conference. Approximately 250 school teams attended the conference to focus on math strategies to take back to their classroom.



The WVDE continues to support educator professional learning and student achievement through the *math4life* grants to educators from 29 counties with both professional learning and supplies.

These include:

- 38 Classroom Educator Grants totaling \$34,060
- 23 County Mathematics Professional Learning Grants totaling \$109,110
- » 13 Building Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics Grants for books for professional learning totaling \$123,500

What's on Deck

During the 2023-24 school year, the math initiative will move to full implementation.

This, along with the new math standards, will target advancing student proficiency leading to a new generation of mathematicians.

Milken Educator

The Milken Educator Award is a national award often referred to as the "Oscars of Education." Andrea Trio is West Virginia's 2023 Milken **Andrea Trio** Educator and was surprised with the award during a ceremony at Madison Elementary in Wheeling where she is the principal. Trio builds genuine, trusting relationships with students and keeps track of them as they move to middle school and beyond. Madison's motto is "Stronger Together," a fitting description of the ties Trio builds among students, families, staff, and the larger community.

National Board Certification

West Virginia's commitment to National Board Certification (NBC) is reflected in its national ranking. The gold standard credential in education, NBC represents accomplished teaching practices that profoundly impact student learning. The process can take one to three years and requires the candidate to complete four rigorous components including content knowledge, differentiated instruction, teaching practice and learning environment, and effective/reflective practice. West Virginia is ranked:

- **13th** in the nation for percentage of NBC teachers
- > 17th in the nation for newly certified NBC teachers

West Virginia Teachers of the Year Council

The West Virginia Teachers of the Year Council consists of former winners dedicated to supporting and sharing current WVDE initiatives and programs. Using its experience and expertise, the council uplifts West Virginia educators and utilizes the resources of the WVDE to improve schools and communities. This group is committed to actively supporting public education in West Virginia.

Milken Educator Network Forum

The West Virginia Milken Educator Network hosted 40 TeachWV Grow Your Own Pathway to Teaching high school students during the 2023 Milken Educator Network Forum at the West Virginia Culture Center in Charleston. Attendees received greetings from Governor Jim Justice and First Lady Cathy Justice. Milken Educators facilitated small groups to share their expertise and insights with the students in attendance.

Leaders of Literacy Podcast

The West Virginia Leaders of Literacy Podcast is designed to strengthen early literacy in the Mountain State by providing teachers and educational stakeholders with research and resources centered around school-readiness, attendance, extended learning, and high-quality instruction. The 15 to 20 minute episodes feature insights from educational leaders. It is available on all major podcast platforms with more than **60** episodes.

Teacher prep programs remain focus of efforts

Educators continue to be at the forefront of our schools. Their passion and dedication to West Virginia students is unparalleled. The West Virginia Board of Education and the West Virginia Department of Education maintain educator and service personnel support throughout all challenges, continuing to build resources that promote personal and professional development.

Teacher preparation programs are the cornerstone of these efforts. The Grow Your Own (GYO) Pathway to Teaching initiative is currently in its second year. Forty counties are participating and students are making strides with:

» 250 high school students enrolled

» Average 3.6 GPA

* \$90,000 in tuition savings for families.

Celebrating Future Teachers

The WVDE welcomed members of the first cohort of GYO scholars to Charleston to celebrate their achievements. Graduating seniors received a stole embroidered with the logo and "first class" to recognize their early involvement in

the program. All students who were enrolled in the first class will receive the same stole when they graduate.

With the U.S. Department
of Labor's (DOL) approval
of the WVDE as a Registered
Apprenticeship Program for
the K-12 Teaching Occupation,
more opportunities are
opening for future

teachers.


Additionally, the DOL has awarded West Virginia with grant funding of up to \$2.5 million over the next five years to support teaching apprenticeships. This allows high school students to pursue a teaching career and earn a wage to do so. Seven counties are participating in the apprenticeship program. For more information, visit *TeachWV.com*.

Other supports include:

- Sov. Jim Justice, the West Virginia Department of Commerce, and Workforce West Virginia provided \$400,000 to support the state's Registered Apprenticeship Program, which also ensures funds are available to support the paraprofessional pipeline to teacher licensure.
- » The Benedum Foundation covers the cost of

dual credit courses for GYO students through a \$240,000 grant.

» Study.com and Passage Preparation offer test preparation materials at no cost to assist students with their Praxis exams.

SUPPORTING DISTRICTS

The 55 counties of West Virginia are unique, independent districts that ultimately have the same goal: providing high-quality education and care to West Virginia students. The West Virginia Board of Education and the West Virginia Department of Education collaborate with county leaders to ensure all children in each district receive the support and resources they need to prepare for a lifetime of learning.

Third Grade Success Act (HB 3035)

The WVDE worked closely with leaders of the West Virginia Legislature in support of the Third Grade Success Act (HB 3035). This bill passed during the 2023 session and creates a statewide comprehensive approach to early literacy and numeracy in grades K-3. The legislation includes components related to pre-and in-service teacher training, additional support personnel in first through third grade classrooms, benchmark assessments to identify students struggling with literacy and numeracy including indicators for dyslexia and dyscalculia, multi-tiered systems of support, intervention, parent notification, and extended year programs.

This bill aims to advance overall education programs and operations by creating additional educational requirements to close the reading and mathematics gaps, increase

the functionality of classroom operations, and to create a program that encourages West Virginia students to remain in their communities, post-graduation.

West Virginia K-12 Job Bank

The WVDE launched the West Virginia K-12 Job Bank during the 2022 school year as a tool for job seekers to discover career opportunities in public education. Applicants create a profile online and can apply to numerous education vacancies across multiple counties/districts with ease. It is a centralized job portal for K-12 public education positions within all county school districts, the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind, Schools of Diversion and Transition, and the State Department of Education. INVEST Educational Symposium

Charleston and Morgantown hosted teams of educators during the summer INVEST conference. The WVDE's latest initiatives, Ready, Read, Write, West Virginia and UNITe with Numeracy were on display. Teachers, administrators, and education leaders learned new techniques and best practices in addressing student achievement. This also served as an opportunity to collaborate and share strategies with educators from around the state.

- » More than 500 administrators and teachers attended the Charleston INVEST Conference.
- » More than 700 administrators and teachers attended the Morgantown INVEST Conference.

Special Education Office Provides Additional Supports for Identified Schools

During the 2022-2023 school year, the WVDE's Special Education Office worked with approximately 50 West Virginia schools falling into the category of Comprehensive Support and Improvement - Additional Targeted Support Schools (CSI-ATS). The identified schools struggled to meet proficiency requirements within the special education subgroup, as identified under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) using the Balanced Score Card results from the General Summative Assessment (GSA).

By the close of the school year, each school received a targeted on-site review to determine areas of needed improvement or additional support. The schools are concluding the first of a three-year process in which special education subgroup goals are set and addressed through a plan of action to provide students with disabilities a rigorous and inclusive education.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE CENTERS (TAC)

STEAM TAC

The Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics Technical Assistance
Center (STEAM TAC) in Morgantown enhances educational opportunities among West
Virginia middle school students statewide by focusing on all content areas and promoting problem-solving and critical thinking skills.

Since January 2022, the STEAM TAC has visited all **55** counties, **248** schools, impacted **31,353** students, and driven more than **60,000** miles.

Early Learning TAC

The Early Learning Technical Assistance Center (ELTAC) is hosted by Marshall University's June Harless Center and offers high-quality professional learning and support related to the PK-5 West Virginia College- and Career-Readiness Standards. The ELTAC strives to be a resource which educators across the Mountain State can use to elevate their educational practices to improve reading and writing achievement for all children as they progress through PK-5 education.

- » ELTAC reached 2,780 participants across 125 professional learning sessions and technical assistance meetings.
- » ELTAC specialists traveled 22,063 miles across all 55 counties.

Behavior and Mental Health TAC

The Behavior and Mental Health Technical
Assistance Center is housed at the Autism
Training Center at Marshall University and was
created as a response to local providers needing
assistance related to student behavior/mental
health. The center offers training and technical
assistance in a variety of areas including early
childhood positive behavior, school-wide
positive behavior, and mental health.

This TAC helps provide continuity of existing interventions in public schools based upon the national models and research related to multitiered systems of support and interconnected systems framework. Projects include:

West Virginia Schools of Diversion and Transition

The West Virginia Schools of Diversion and Transition (WVSDT) maintain the important

role of providing educational services to more than **6,000** juveniles and adults housed in residential and state-operated facilities. The WVSDT also prepares these students to successfully transition to public school, employment, and to life in their communities as responsible, productive citizens.

Additionally, the WVSDT works with county school districts, local probation officers, judges, and the Bureau of Juvenile Services to share resources and provide counseling and mentoring to students who are in danger of not graduating due to truancy. The WVSDT partnered with 11 local school districts to deliver education-based truancy diversion efforts to 408 students.

West Virginia Outreach Center for the Deaf and the Blind

The West Virginia Outreach Center for the Deaf and the Blind (WVOCDB) is a comprehensive facility created to serve as a WVDE Technical Assistance Center. The facility, located in Romney, provides services and resources that support all deaf/hard of hearing (DHH), visually impaired, and deafblind students statewide. The impact is growing in response to the statewide need and shortages.

Reach includes:

- * 411 students with a primary exceptionality of DHH
- > 284 students with a primary exceptionality of blind/low vision
- 257 direct services (in-person and virtually) provided by Birth to Five specialists
- 93 services provided by K-12 specialists

CHALLENGE & THRIVE

The West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and the Blind (WVSDB) received a grant from the Save the Music Foundation to purchase new instruments and the Hampshire County Community Foundation Grant to plant a pollinator garden at the school for students and staff to enjoy. This school year also saw the return of sports and clubs including swimming, track, basketball, goal ball, Student Government, and National Honor Society. E-Sports was also introduced for students who wished to participate.

Sen. Joe Manchin invited students from the school to the United States Capitol in Washington, D.C. During the trip, students had accessible tours of the Capitol featuring American Sign Language presentations and tactile access to the displays. The WVSDB Tapestry students were also invited to sing for state legislators at the West Virginia State Capitol. The WVSDB recognized their seniors planning to attend college and provided resources for parents and families. Furthermore, the school released multiple promotional videos highlighting the school and various programs offered to students throughout the year.

School Improvement Supports School Success

School improvement is realized through intensive supports offered by the WVDE's Office of School Improvement. In fall 2022, 33 of 34 schools in 17 counties exited Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) status. These schools were identified through the 2018 West Virginia Balanced Scorecard as those in most need of intensive support. As a result, each school received on-site support and professional learning, coaching, and mentoring.

In fall of 2022, a new round of CSI schools was identified with 21 schools in 16 counties. The Office of School Improvement completed a comprehensive diagnostic review and report for each school. Each school will receive intensive support over the next three years focused on the West Virginia Standards for Effective Schools.

Local Food Sources Support Child Nutrition

The Office of Child Nutrition is assisting counties to explore options that address

supply chain disruptions and also strengthen regional food supply lines. During the 2022-2023 school year, West Virginia received federal grants equaling \$2,787,804 in Supply Chain Assistance funds and \$1,222,078 in funding through the Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement. The Office of Child Nutrition is disbursing these funds to school districts that participate in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). Using a prescribed formula, each School Food Authority (SFA) receives a base level of \$5,000, and then an additional amount based on their total enrollment. This includes all public schools, private schools, Residential Child Care Institutions and charter schools that participate in the NSLP program. The proportional amount is intended to provide resources that scale with the size of the student population served by a SFA while ensuring that all districts receive some amount of funding.

Both sources of funding significantly increase the opportunity for school districts to purchase local foods.
