Executive Summary

West Virginia Department of Education Office of School Operations & Finance – School Facilities

Introduction: The Kanawha County Board of Education respectfully requests approval for the closure of George C. Weimer Elementary School and its consolidation into Alban Elementary School and Bridgeview Elementary School. This closure is not contingent upon any other actions, and it is proposed to occur at the end of the 2023-2024 school year.

Changes: The Kanawha County Board of Education requests approval of the following:

• The closure of George C. Weimer Elementary School and its consolidation into Alban Elementary School and Bridgeview Elementary School. This closure is not contingent upon any other actions, and it is proposed to occur at the end of the 2023-2024 school year. In consideration of this closure, applicable West Virginia State Board of Education policies were reviewed and followed. Documents were available for public inspection for the required amount of time, and a closure hearing was held for George C. Weimer Elementary School on May 4, 2023. Hearings for the receiving schools, Alban Elementary School and Bridgeview Elementary School were held on May 4, 2023. The Kanawha County Board of Education voted to approve this closure and consolidation at their board meeting at the conclusion of the hearing on May 4, 2023.

Impact: The consolidation of these schools will enable Kanawha County Schools to operate their schools more efficiently.

3.2. Executive Summary and Impact Statements

County Procedures

An executive summary shall be prepared including the following items that will summarize with page references to the county's documentation, as defined in section 3.1, those items listed and shall be provided to the WVDE School Facilities Services unit.

The Kanawha County Board of Education has experienced a loss in students over the past ten years. The overall student enrollment has decreased in enrollment by -15.5%. This represents a loss of 4,362 students from 2013/14 – 2022/23. In an effort to provide an equal and quality education to each student in Kanawha County Board the Kanawha County of Education proposes to consolidate services. This would not only save the Board of Education operating expense, but it would allow the county to provide an education curriculum that they currently cannot afford to provide all students.

The Kanawha County Board of Education proposes to merge George C. Weimer Elementary School to the existing Alban Elementary School and Bridgeview Elementary School, thus closing George C. Weimer Elementary School. The Merge would provide the following:

- The desire to meet the Economy of Scale guidelines of the SBA and the State Department of Education.
- Improving school transportation efficiency and complying with guidelines for length of bus rides for students to all facilities.
- Housing all students in permanently constructed facilities.
- Increasing the efficiency of operations of all facilities.

Enrollment 3.2.a.

Kanawha County has had a 14,944 decrease in population from 2010 through 2019. The student enrollment at George C. Weimer Elementary School has decreased by 34 students over the past ten years, and is projected to decrease by another 9 students over the next ten years. Alban Elementary School has decreased by 121 students over the past ten years, and is projected to decrease by another 38 students over the next ten years. Bridgeview Elementary School has decreased by 64 students over the past ten years, and is projected to decrease by another 40 students over the next ten years. The merger of George C. Weimer into these two schools would benefit all three student populations by decreasing the operating expenses and providing a better learning atmosphere and curriculum for students.

Facilities 3.2.b.

George C. Weimer Elementary School is 2.5 miles from Alban Elementary School, and 3.5 miles from Bridgeview Elementary School. George C. Elementary School is in average condition, but it is not ADA compliant. George C. Weimer has a 44.8% building utilization rate. Alban Elementary School is in average condition, with a 56.3% building utilization rate. Bridgeview Elementary School is in average condition, with a 67.0% building utilization rate. The exsting facilities have been reviewed and evaluated during the recent CEFP process. The SBA form 134 Worksheets are shown in the Appendix of Supporting Data. The space Utilization is also listed for each facility.

3.2. Executive Summary and Impact Statements

County Procedures

Finance 3.2.c.

In an effort to provide an equal and quality education to each student in Kanawha County the board proposes to consolidate services. This closure and consolidation would save the Board of Education \$387,279.00 annualy. Savings on maintenance and operating expenses on aging buildings that they currently do not have the finances to properly maintain.

Personnel 3.2.d.

The County Board of Education has attempted to reduce staff due to a loss in enrollment over the past ten years to meet the formula for professional and service personnel. This closure and consolidation would result in a reduction of 8 Professional Personnel and 6 Service Personnel. Kanawha County will continue to follow the WVDE recommended guidelines on the number of employees but maintain the number of staff required to deliver the education programs made available to its students. Some Staff may be reduced due to the duplication of positions after merger.

Transportation 3.2.e.

There are no negative variances with any of the bus routes from the Green Valley of Saint Albans, Jefferson, or Spring Hill of South Charleston areas. The routes will not exceed the thirty minute guidline as outlined in the WVDE Policy 6200, et al. Detailed information is found on page twenty one of this document.

Educational Program 3.2.f.

Kanawha County Schools ensures an engaging educational environment for learners (students and adults) focusing on teaching and learning in the 21st century. Our mssion statement is "to provide a world-class education that ensures success for every student in the 21st century. We Believe: All student CAN achieve. Quality teaching is the key to student success."

Written Facility Condition Description

Written description of the physical condition of the school targeted for closure or consolidation and the school or schools which the county designates to receive the students. This description shall include age, number of buildings, general condition, adequacy of structural, electrical, and mechanical systems to provide a safe and healthful environment.

George C. Weimer Elementary School is a 22,221 square foot non sprinkled multi-level masonry building. The orginal 9,288 square foot section was constructed in 1951. This section of the building contains six of the thirteen classrooms, restrooms, Library, Computer Lab,Counselor's Office, and mechanical room. In 1961 George C. Weimer Elementary School received a 8,602 square foot seven classroom, office suite, and mechanical room addition. In 1969 a 4,331 square foot addition was added. This addition would contain a kitchen, multipurpose room, and custodial office. George C. Weimer currently uses one portable for offices.

The 1951 section of George C. Weimer needs to be made ADA accessible. A new secured entry is needed and office is needed in the front of the building. The current Main Entry is located in the rear of the school, and is not visible from the parking lot or the front of the school. Aesthetically there are many repairs needed. Major window, roof, HVAC, and electrical renovations are needed. The wooden soffits and fascia need to be replaced. The hot water boiler and electrical panels in the mechanical room located in the 1951 section of the building has been on fire in the past. A separate hot water boiler serves the 1961 section. Window units are used for cooling in the majority of the building. The 1969 section of the building utilizes roof top units for heating and cooling.

Alban Elementary School is a 28,753 square foot sprinkled single story masonry building. The original 9,147 square foot section was constructed in 1962. This section of the building contains six of the nineteen classrooms, half of the multipurpose room, kitchen, speech, and counselor's office. In 1969 Alban Elementary School received a 4,217 square foot three classroom and office suite addition. In 2001 a 15,389 square foot addition was added. This addition would contain a ten classrooms, library, computer lab, multipuropose expansion, and kitchen expansion. Alban Elementary currently uses one portable.

Alban Elementary School needs a secured entry. An addition would allow for the removal of the portable. Aesthetic repairs are needed, but overall the school is clean and in good condition. Window, HVAC, and electrical renovations are needed. Approximatly 65% of the EPDM roof is at the end of its expected life span. Hot water boilers, and window units are utilized for the HVAC system through out the majority of the building. Roof Top Units are utilized for HVAC in the 2001 additions. Split systems are used for the HVAC system in the cafeteria and gymnasium.

Bridgeview Elementary School is a non-sprinkled 66,845 square foot two story masonry building. The orginal 52,916 square foot section was constructed in 1953. This section of the building contains the office suite, gymnasium, stage, cafetreia, library, the bulk of the thirty classrooms, and mechanical room in the basement. In 1962 Bridgeview Elementary School received a 11,539 square foot seven classroom, office, and restroom addition. In 1969 a 2,570 square foot addition was added. This addition would contain one classroom, office, and a photography classroom.

County Procedures

A secured entry is needed at Bridgeview Elementary School. Aesthetically, repairs are needed, but overall the school is clean and in good condition. Masonry repairs and possible structural repairs are needed in the gymnasium and some of the upstair classrooms. A window replacement project replaced most of the original windows, however there are still a few original windows that need replaced. Bridgeview Elementary is scheduled for an HVAC and roof replacement with funds from the approved Kanawha County Schools 2024 School Levy. Triad boilers and window units are utilized through out the majority of the building.

Educational Programs and Related Student Services

Evaluation of the school targeted for closure or consolidation and the school or schools that the county designates to receive the students in regard to the school(s) adaptability to the present and proposed educational programs, and the provisions of related student services.

Policy 6200 guidelines were used in the planning and implementation of the closure of George C. Weimer Elementary School. The latest Comprehensive Educational Facilities Plan will be used in planning and developing any facility improvements at Alban Elementary School or Bridgeview Elementary School, the receiving schools.

Alban Elementary School and Bridgeview Elementary School have adequate space for special needs students. Space is available for Pre-kindergarten classrooms, Kindergrten classrooms, Emotional Disturbance classroom, and Intellectual Disability classroom. Instruction will be designed to teach the West Virginia Content Standars and Objectives.

Alban Elementary and Bridgeview Elementary students, teachers, and staff use technology on a daily basis. The school serves as a Pre-k through 5th with one team per grade level. Student support programs are in place along with the appropriate support staff. Wireless internet access is available throughout the school.

The orginal 1951 section of George C. Weimer Elementary School is not ADA accessible. The 1961 addition and the 1969 addition are ADA accessible depending on which entrance is used. To access either the 1961 addition from the 1969 addition or the 1969 addition from the 1961 addition, a disabled person would have to exit the facility and go around the outside of the building. Three ADA accessible restrooms are located in the 1961 addition near the office.

Alban Elementary School maintains ADA accessability through out the entirety of the building. Alban has two single occupant ADA accessible restrooms in the building.

Bridgeview Elementary School maintains ADA accessability through out the entirety of the building. Bridgeview Elementary School has several ADA accessible single occupant toilets throughout the building.

Grade Configurations and Educational Programs

Elaboration on the effect the proposed school closing or consolidation will have on the school system's future plans regarding grade configuration, educational programs, and facility requirements.

The closure of George C. Weimer Elementary School would allow for more efficient and increased dispersion of resources to areas of need. It would give the students of Kanawha County Schools access to more appropriate and advantageous educational programs.

To Whom it May Concern,

We are writing this letter in the hopes that you will hear our voices regarding the matter of potentially closing our school. We have developed a list of reasons for why our school should remain opened, along with some cherished memories during our time at Weimer Elementary.

"I have been here only 1 year, but I feel that this is my second home." These words came from one of our fellow members on the topic of possible consolidation. She transferred in from another country to escape the happenings going on around her. She has found comfort in our school, built relationships with staff members and students alike, and represented our school in numerous capacities all in one year. This is a testament to how Weimer was able to embrace a student from another country and treat her as if she has always been a part of us. Other members unanimously agreed that the small class sizes and homey-feel provide the majority of the students great comfort here at Weimer Elementary. Fifth grade students specifically expressed their concern about students getting "lost" and "forgotten" should they have to transition to a larger school. The small student population at Weimer allows teachers and students to build stronger relationships that last well beyond when they leave a particular grade level. However, the students aren't just concerned about themselves and their classmates, they are concerned about teachers as well. "Teachers would lose their jobs and then would have to find another job", noted another one of our members. The students here at Weimer are so close to their teachers that they are truly concerned about their well-being and livelihood. As our members were considering other reasons to not close our school, we reminisced on all of the prior events and happenings that have taken place at our school over the years. ADMINISTRATION'S PRESENTATION

Dr. Williams-Thank you all for being here this evening. School closures are among the most difficult recommendations that anyone in my position can make. We know that our schools are fixtures in our communities and they mean so much to the areas they serve. We do not take these recommendations lightly and please know that we are here to listen and I know that we will keep the meeting civil and respectful. As many of you know, Kanawha County School's student population is shrinking. In the last 10 years we have lost approximately 4,400 students. The West Virginia Legislature funds school systems based on their number of pupils, therefore, over the last 10 years we have also lost the funding associated with those 4,400 students. That equates to almost 500 positions being lost over the last 10 years and approximately \$29,000,000 in state funding over the same period. The West Virginia Legislature is the only group that can change the state funding formula. In addition to the loss of funding, we are also facing increases in required spending in the area of utilities, waste management, maintenance, and an increase in our mandatory liability insurance. Kanawha County Schools has been very good with budgeting and we have been able to absorb large losses without cutting deeply into schools or programs, but we are at the point now where we cannot continue to cut positions without also consolidating schools. You are probably wondering why my school. When making these difficult recommendations for consolidation this year, I had to first look at the schools that could be consolidated without significant additional costs to the district. The three schools selected were Grandview, Marmet and Weimer. They were selected because there are schools nearby that can accept the students without any additions. Anytime there is a school consolidation there is concern by staff at both the closing school and the accepting school over staff retention and the process. When the staffing transfer season occurs, all staff across the county will vote on whether to give priority ranking to the teachers from Weimer, in this case at Alban and Bridgeview, so if they would have to hire additional teachers at Alban and Bridgeview and the county would vote to give the Weimer teachers priority, then they would have priority and historically in the past that has always happened. Please note that the proposed school closures would not happen immediately. If approved, schools would not see a change until the 2024-25 school year. This would enable a full year of opportunity for closing schools and receiving schools to work together on transition activities where students and parents can attend different events at their new school. We recently went through a similar process with the closure of Cedar Grove Middle and moved those kids into DuPont and it was very successful. As outlined in the meeting notice, speakers will have 5 minutes to speak. If you are unable to get through your remarks or questions in that time or you don't wish to speak, you may submit your written remarks to us. First we will hear from the folks from Weimer and then we will hear from the folks at Alban and Bridgeview.

SPEAKERS WHO HAVE SIGNED UP TO ADDRESS THE BOARD FROM WEIMER ELEMENTARY

Megan Gillispie-I have kids that go to Weimer and I have a little guy that will be attending preschool this fall. My kids have gone to this school since 2013. I worked at the school for two years. They are not just teachers to us, they are family. These are some of the most wonderful teachers and staff that I have ever met. Having such small classes allows these kids to be noticed. I'm not saying that Alban and Bridgeview aren't wonderful, I'm sure they are, but these kids get to have one-on-one with these teachers and they are able to be noticed if they are lacking in academics and if they need that extra love, these teachers see that. Some of these kids don't get the parents that care and these teachers and staff do. Some of these kids have been together since preschool and they will be separated. I tell everyone that Weimer is a hidden gem. I hope you guys will keep the school open.

Carrie Miller-I have a daughter in Weimer. My daughter is special needs and she has severe behavioral issues and had a speech problem and I couldn't understand anything she said. I met with the teacher and told her I was concerned. She told me not to worry and that they would love her and would make it work. Her teachers have done wonderful things. I can now understand what she is saying and she doesn't have any behavioral problems anymore. She is the sweetest thing and it's because of the staff there. She loves it so much. It's better for her to be in a small classroom where she can have one-on-one time. I just would appreciate if you would not close her school down.

Daniella Martinez-How many principals do you know that can stand outside and greet every child by name? My 1st grader is kind of a troubled child. I have broken down and cried with the school counselor concerned with not knowing what to do with my child. Instead of just telling me everything would be okay, she found resources for us and continued to check in on my child. When I think about Weimer, I think about community and inclusiveness and the staff and their love for all those students. I ask you to keep George C. Weimer open.

Alisa Horielova-I feel so much that the school is my second home. This school needs to stay open. Most of the kids are concerned about the transition to a larger school. The students aren't just concerned about themselves they are concerned about the teachers and staff having to find another job. We have so many good things at our school, field trips, guest speakers, concerts and more. All of the students sit on the floor and we talk about how to be responsible, accepting and respectful. We learn how to be nice and kind. We have different dress up days. This school needs to remain open. We want these opportunities to be given to other students, that's why our school should remain open.

<u>SPEAKERS WHO HAVE SIGNED UP TO ADDRESS THE BOARD FROM WEIMER ELEMENTARY</u> (continued)

Sarah Hewett-I am the counselor at Weimer. It is my 7th year. A lot of our kids have been through a lot of trauma and my biggest concern for them is that they will be lost and no one will know what they have been through and it will be another traumatizing experience for them. I know financially, the most responsible thing for you to do is close schools and consolidate, but if there is any way to keep it open so the kids won't lose stability. I would just ask that you take care of our babies and don't let them be lost. Please make sure that they are taken care of and that they are supported. At the very least, if you are going to close us down, give them extra staff so they have people who are there to care for them. They are used to having teachers who have known them their whole life. Please, if there is any way to keep them together there is something to be said for a small school. I worry that they won't have that love and support somewhere else.

Nichole Stephenson-I am the aunt of a Weimer student. When my sister-in-law said they were moving to West Virginia from Phoenix I picked Weimer for my nephew. I am the mom of two sons who went to a small community school. When Mrs. Snead interviewed me when I brought Kaden in, she specifically asked why I chose Weimer and I said because you are a small school. The class size, the test scores, the small community. The small community of that school will follow those kids. This is a friendship and a family that never goes away. This is what these kids and this community needs. The way to keep your population up is to give these children a sense of community and family. That gives them something to stick around for. You can't look at formulas and headcounts. It doesn't translate to what these children need. Give them a reason to stay. Home starts with Weimer.

Wayne Stephenson-Although my nephew isn't going to be affected by the closure, I'm thinking of our future kids who will attend a small school like Weimer. The opportunities that are presented at Weimer may be more than they get at other locations. When you start adding students to a classroom, it's too easy to get lost. You can't know each individual student and in order to be successful and succeed they need to be given every opportunity like they get at a small school.

Cary Hess-The Board of Education has already decided to close down two schools and now they are considering another and because of this schools will be overcrowded, children will be left behind, teachers will be overworked and members of those closed schools will be laid off. Children in our community will have to experience being the new kid in school. Why is this happening? The truth is the Board of Education doesn't have enough money to keep schools open because the legislative funding is not enough.

SPEAKERS WHO HAVE SIGNED UP TO ADDRESS THE BOARD FROM WEIMER ELEMENTARY (continued)

The legislature has stabbed us in the back so that is why I am inviting everyone in this room to demand better for our students, educators and school staff. Next Monday from 5-6:00 I am going to have a protest at the State Capitol in the lower rotunda. I want everyone in that building to hear this. Tell everyone you know.

Summer Drake-I actually no longer work at Weimer but they still have my heart. When I think of Weimer the first two letters speak out to me. First, we are like a family. We are a group of hard-working individuals who would stop at nothing to make sure our job is done and every student was reached. The tight-knit small school feel is something that cannot be replaced. We all know that we were there for the kids. We took the time to learn every new curriculum that was thrown at us whether we liked it or not. We got there early and stayed late. We built relationships with family. We begged for help for those kids. You will be losing a great school that has been cherished by families for many years. The county may save money, but at what cost? I hope this decision will not be made lightly.

Amber Brown-I previously worked at Weimer. It was certainly one of the most challenging times of my life because our kids have a lot of needs, but my heart is there. I began to tell people that Weimer was the best kept secret in the county. We did so much. We all worked as a team and a family. I would like to say that we couldn't function without Pam Snead. We worked very hard to get the health bus and Pam spearheaded that. We also worked hard for the track at Weimer with fundraisers and contests to raise thousands of dollars for that.

SPEAKERS WHO HAVE SIGNED UP TO ADDRESS THE BOARD FROM ALBAN ELEMENTARY

Johnna Jacobs, Principal at Alban Elementary-I know there is nothing that I can say tonight to make families feel like you will be okay right at this moment, but if the Board does decide to close down Weimer, I do want you to know that we will love your babies. Pam and I already work together on a lot of things because we do have a lot of the same community members, but we will do everything we can to make your kids feel included and loved and taken care of and we have an amazing staff as well. Pam and I have discussed, just in case, some of the things that both schools can do together so you can meet the teachers and talk to the staff and some of the kids that are there, so this year we planned to have some family nights together and combine some movie nights. We want our kids to grow together. We have talked about joint professional development so that the Weimer teachers can teach the Alban teachers any secrets you may have that we can learn from you about your kids. Some things you may be interested

in about Alban is that we have a guitar club after school, we have multiple outdoor classroom spaces, we have a garden in the back and the vegetables are put on the salad bar that are harvested. We have a wonderful PTO. While nothing I say will make you feel any less sad if Weimer closes, I want you to know that you will be welcomed with open arms at Alban.

SPEAKERS WHO HAVE SIGNED UP TO ADDRESS THE BOARD FROM BRIDGEVIEW ELEMENTARY

Stephenie Haynes, Principal at Bridgeview Elementary-Listening to you all speak I hate feeling like the villain in someone's story. I talk to Pam on a weekly basis. We swap kids back and forth already. If the Board decides to close Weimer one thought that came into my head is I think it would be a good idea for the counselor at Weimer to come and meet with our counselors and have a sit down and share your wealth of knowledge so that if we do indeed bring your babies on board, we will have a head start. Bridgeview has a Communities in Schools Program so we have an extra staff member on hand that is a go-to girl for everything. Through the Communities in Schools Program we have Louie, our service dog. He visits all the classrooms, he greets 400 children every morning. He is a big part of our community. We have a food pantry and a clothing closet. We also have the BARR Program which is building assets and reducing risks. We keep track of children building-wide and we share that information so your babies don't fall through the cracks. Even though Bridgeview is a larger school, we do make those connections with children and if are fortunate enough to absorb your babies, we will make those connections. I do know the names of all 400 children in my building. We will make the best of this situation if this does happen. We will plan family nights to get to know you all.

NEW BUSINESS

A. George C. Weimer Elementary School

Mr. Ric Cavender moved: The Board close George C. Weimer Elementary School at the end of the 2023-24 school year and consolidate students into Alban Elementary and Bridgeview Elementary, for the reasons stated and as described in the closure documents provided to the public. Motion was seconded by Mr. Jim J. Crawford.

NEW BUSINESS (continued)

Mr. Crawford-I've been in this community since 1962. I came to St. Albans High School as a teacher and we had 1,850 kids. The school was busting at the seams. We had St. Albans Jr. High, Hayes and McKinley and they were busting at the seams. Today we are not utilizing the total building. We don't have the students that we did at that time. We don't have the money that we had in those days. What we are trying to do is make this thing work and keep Kanawha County Schools' budget within its means. When I came on the Board in 2000, we were \$10 million dollars in the red. Dr. Duerring and the Board worked to get that erased and it took 3 years to get us back in the black and it hasn't been in the red since then. This Board has a fiduciary responsibility to make sure this system functions in a prudent manner. This consolidation won't cost the Board any money. I don't like closing schools. It's not popular with me or the people in our community but we have to make sure that we do what is right with the taxpayers in this county.

Mr. White-I agree with a lot of the speakers here that it is better to have smaller community schools. Small classrooms is something very desirable. It's unfortunate that we are put in this position. We have a school aid formula based strictly on per capita per student and it doesn't have to be that way. Almost every other state doesn't base their school aid formula on per student it's based on other factors. It's very antiquated. We've asked the legislature to change the school aid formula and they have not done anything to change it. This puts us in a bad situation. It's unfortunate because our state has a \$1.7 billion dollar surplus and it could have been used to help with things like this.

Mr. Cavender-This is by far the toughest thing that the Board is tasked to do. We know that these decisions affect you. Mrs. Hewett had mentioned her special needs daughter and I had a question about how that looks if any special needs student goes to another school. Dr. Williams-Their IEP is transferred and the information is given back and forth between their teachers and Megan and her specialists work and try to make it as smooth as possible. Mr. Cavender-I really appreciate everyone taking the time and sharing your thoughts about this wonderful community school.

Mrs. Jordon-I appreciate everyone coming out this evening and everyone's comments.

Mrs. White-These are probably the hardest decisions that we have had to make. This is when we have to look at you as a community and make a decision and it's not easy. I will say that Weimer was where my son Bailey started Kindergarten in an autism room. Speaking of special education and IEP minutes, I would like to request for any of the schools that we are closing if we could possibly have a day sometime, like we do for our 9th graders when they transition to high school, for all of our students, not just our IEP

students in the schools that are closing that they can go see their new school before school begins. I agree with Mr. White, I was there every day at the Capitol with the teachers when they were on strike saying we need small classrooms. That is the best scenario for our kids but we can't do anything about this formula. It doesn't care about what our kids go through in their personal lives, it doesn't care about how many grandparents are raising their kids and then you through COVID. We as a Board have to make hard decisions. I wish we didn't have to. I apologize that we are here and we have to make these decisions.

Dr. Williams-I spent 17 years in this building and when I moved to St. Albans 38 years ago, we had 6 elementary schools just inside the city limits and since that time you all know what has happened. My daughter was in the 4th grade at High Lawn and it was closed and she went to Alban for her 5th grade year. She did well. My wife and I supported her through the process and I know if the Board makes that decision that you all will support your children. I understand how you feel because I have been in your seat before. It's not a good decision to make.

The above motion unanimously carried.
